Student Section: Science Report

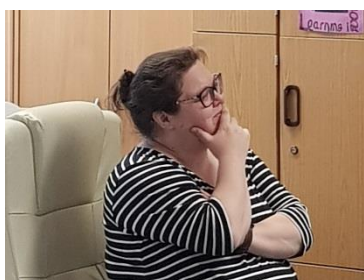
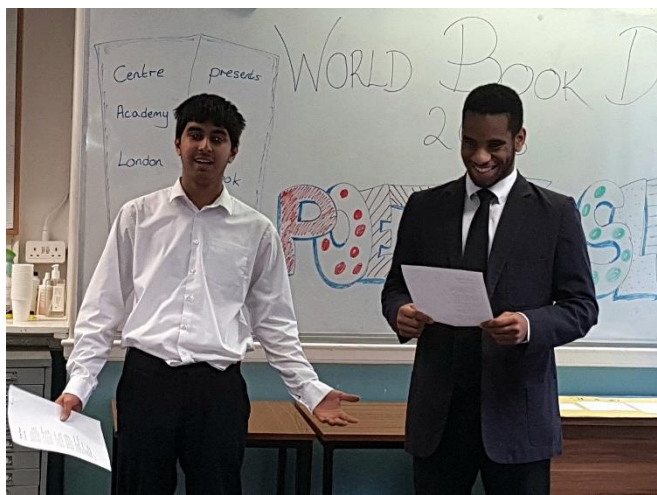
This week there has been a mixture of exciting and sad news, but let's start with the good news! This week NASA has started the HAMMER project. This project stands for 'Hypervelocity Asteroid Mitigation Mission for Emergency Response' or HAMMER for short. This project is to help stop any future asteroids that could threaten the Earth, as we are overdue for a large-scale asteroid (about once in 50-60 million years). This project won't destroy asteroids (except for small ones) but instead use nuclear weapons to move large asteroids off course a small amount so that they miss Earth.

However, the sad news is that Stephen Hawking, a person who inspired millions, died in his sleep at the age of 76. He looked at the stars and devised ideas that people will be studying for years to come, like a new age Einstein. Unlike Einstein, however, he worked with a degrading body, and yet was able to achieve more than multiple people do in their lives! He has shown that anybody can work in science no matter their condition.
