Dear Parent/Carer,

As we continue to celebrate our students' achievements and capture special moments during school events, we kindly request your cooperation in ensuring the safety and privacy of all children.

- 2. **Educate**: Talk to your child about the importance of privacy and respecting others' boundaries.

Therapy Community Group Spring Updates



Cooking Club

Students have been working very well in their Occupational Therapy Cooking Club Intervention and have baked lots of tasty treats this term!

Students have made oreo brownies, cookies, pizzas, and pancakes, to support the development of their sensory, motor, and independent living skills. They have then sold these to their school community during break times, as well as doing an excellent job of advertising and manging finances.

The students have decided that this term, they would like the proceeds to be donated to the charity Head Way. The charity supports individuals who are recovering from brain injury and so far have raised an amazing £32.50!

It has been lovely to watch the children make lots of brilliant progress, learning in the process about the different food groups and the importance of food for helping our bodies and minds develop and function. Students should be very proud of themselves!







Fine Motor Group

Students have started an exciting project this term, creating lots of brilliant crafts to sell at the school Easter service!

This has been a very good way to help students develop a range of areas, such as manual dexterity, visual motor, and fine motor skills, through engagement with fun activities. Students have been working to upcycle old glass jars to create beautiful easter jars, as well as recycled clay to make lovely earrings. Students have also enjoyed making bracelets and keyrings, all of which



will be available to purchase at the school Easter service to help raise money for the charity 'head way'.





Walking Group

Walking Group Discussion for walk What is self-kindness? Why is it important? How can we be kinder to ourselves? My kindness pledge of the week: The walking group have continued to enjoy exploring the local community this term, enjoying a visit to the local park which was great fun!

The group have also been working to build a stronger sense of self identity through exploration of all their wonderful traits which make them unique and brilliant. Students have also been exploring the concept of 'self-kindness', discussing ways in which they can be kinder to themselves, identifying areas such as 'setting good boundaries with others', 'stop comparing ourselves to others', 'saying 3 kind things to ourselves a day', and 'reframing negative thoughts into more positive thoughts'.

The group have also been supporting with the fine motor group easter project by decorating jars and making bracelets for the easter service.



Life Skills

Our life skills groups have been exploring the topic of voluntary work this term, exploring areas they can volunteer to support both their school and local community. The group have begun volunteering to support the school kitchen with the delivery of snacks at break time, which is so far working fantastically. It has been brilliant to observe the students get involved and the feedback from kitchen staff has been very positive!

Students have also volunteered to support their school community by helping to renovate the school allotment. Students have been coming up with lots of ideas on how the space can be used, such as a herb garden, an outdoor gym, an outdoor class space, a sensory garden, and many more! Students have written a letter to Mrs Gilbert expressing their brilliant ideas. They are now in the process of creating a business pitch to present, exploring what resources they will need and how long the project will take.



Siberian Drama

GCSE Drama Students completed 40% of their exam last term, devising drama from the stimulus of a painting of 'The Mary Celeste', performing a piece in the style of Documentary and Epic Theatre, producing a court room drama based on historical and scientific facts, and including the conventions of multi-rolling, flashbacks, and breaking the fourth wall to involve the audience as 'The Jury'. Throughout this experience, they applied themselves to writing notes, to be able to produce a final Drama Log, (up to 2,500 words), analysing and evaluating how they had achieved this.

By the end of this term, they will have completed 60% of their Drama GCSE, by performing scenes from Oscar Wilde's, 'The Importance of Being Earnest', with the guest of a visiting AQA Examiner in the audience.


What Really Happened <u>To</u> The Mary Celeste?



Speech and Language Therapy News



I would like to congratulate our four members of staff : Ms Bonner, Mrs Gardiner, Ms Coleman, and Mrs Glover on the completion of their level 3 Elklan training: Communication and Language Support for Autistic Pupils.

The staff have been working extremely hard for the past year to complete this course in order to further support their students with communication and language needs within the classroom environment. This evidence-based specialist course has provided our staff members with theoretical knowledge and an abundance of practical skills and ideas to support autistic students and/or those with social communication needs. The level 3 accreditation means that they are now Lead Communication Practitioners (LCPs) and are ready to share their knowledge with the rest of the school staff.

This is the first step towards Centre Academy East Anglia achieving Elklan's Communication Friendly Setting (CFS) accreditation, meaning that all staff will be trained to support our students with their communication and language needs. To achieve this, over the next year our LCPs will be working towards achieving their level 4 and will cascade their knowledge to the rest of the school staff.

PSHE SCHOOL VISITORS

Empowering Voices: Addressing Violence Against Women and Girls

In December and January, older students took a significant step towards understanding and combating the pressing issue of violence against women and girls as we welcomed a special guest speaker, Ms. Teri Cudby, from Terrence Higgins Trust.

Ms. Cudby, over two sessions in December and January, held the attention of students and staff alike, shed light on the harsh realities many women and girls face. She emphasized that violence against women wears many faces, including bullying, emotional abuse, and physical violence, and can occur at home, in schools, and



within our communities. Her visit was so welcome as it complemented our PSHE lessons in what Healthy and Unhealthy Relationships look like.

One of the key points of the talk was the importance of education and awareness. Ms. Cudby stressed that understanding the signs of abuse and the various forms of violence is the first step towards making a change. She encouraged students to foster an environment where mutual respect and equality are the norms, highlighting that everyone has a role to play in this endeavor.

Moreover, our guest speaker provided valuable information on support systems and resources available for victims. She urged the students to be vigilant allies, to listen, and to offer support to peers who may be experiencing such challenges.

Our school pledges to continue this conversation and to take real steps towards ensuring that our community is a place where every individual can thrive, free from violence and discrimination. We were pleased with the students' responses, in making pledges to end Violence against women and girls, with all classes contributing to a display.

The efforts to address violence against women and girls do not end with a single talk or lesson – we are reminded that it is an ongoing commitment to education, support, and advocacy.

Drugsline Education: Alcohol and Addiction

Classes from Year 8 upward welcomed Steven Mervish back into school after delivering sessions on drug abuse last year. The classes were split so it could be more age appropriate for the younger and older years groups. The focus this year was on Alcohol Abuse and addiction. Mr Mervish has a unique way of connecting with students, drawing out conversation, and having them engaged with stories from the' front line'. I wanted to share this letter our school community. You should all be so proud with the way your children engaged with our visitor. It is important to note that this is not a standalone exercise. Students, from the very youngest start their learning around harmful substances, with knowledge and skills to keep safe from harm being built upon year after year within their PSHE lessons.

Dear students and teachers at the Centre Academy,

I could not let yesterday go by without writing to you and telling what an absolute pleasure it was to work with such an inspirational group of young people.

The way I felt from your welcome makes feel very emotional. I told everyone I spoke to last night what an amazing day I had with you all. Two of my children said that I looked so happy and well. Which is really important for me because of how unwell I have been over the past two years.

The respect you showed each other was so fantastic for me to witness. Often when young people are together some tend to forget respect. You really did excel in this and I have so much admiration for you because of it.

I understand that some of you may know someone who is experiencing problems with addiction. You are only too aware of the consequences to the family and the wider community. As a group of young people, you showed a lot of maturity towards the subject, and this can only help support those who are struggling at present. Some of your comments and questions were so good, and I hope I answered them all in a way that you understood and will help you. The pleasure I get from working with young people is enormous and I get very excited at the potential they show.

To end, I would like to thank you all once again for making me so welcome when spending time with you. Those of you who are sitting exams, I would like to wish you all the best, and you can only do your best. Your behaviour and respect only encourages me to continue doing my work. If any of you need support for yourselves, or for someone you love, then please speak to teachers who will know how to contact me. Wishing you all luck in the future and may G-d Bless You All.

Biscay and Red Sea – Colchester Zoo Trip


Biscay and Red Sea enjoyed a day out to Colchester Zoo this term to consolidate learning that had taken place in Science and Geography.


I 'SHELL' be back....
