We are always happy and proud to hear of our students' achievements outside of school as well as in school.


Recently one of our year 10 student, Abigail Robinson' has completed work experience and worked on her photography portfolio at an official book launch.

This year has seen a lot of activity within the careers provision for the older students, alongside their dedicated career's lessons.

In October the Year 10 students attended a Careers Fair at Suffolk New College. There were a variety of employment sectors for the students to visit and engage in activities or discuss what various jobs entailed. The day had so many areas to enjoy from shooting goals at the Ipswich Town area (yes, the students did manage to make me step up!) to changing tyres on a vehicle, working as part of a team. As well as being a fun day it provided so much information for our students, who are at the stage of planning their next steps.

During the year, as part of our connection with the Eastern Education Group of Colleges, we had two talks for our students over the year, where they received information and guidance about choosing options and information about courses which are provided by the groups. The Year 11's visited West Suffolk College and Suffolk One to have a look at the facilities and found both trips interesting and informative.

Year 9 and 10 had the opportunity to visit Asda at Stowmarket to experience a workplace. This was an important trip, as whilst the students may not be considering a career in retail it gave them the chance to speak to Asda employees about their employment – many students realised during the question session that there is normally no eight-week summer holiday when you are working! After the trip to the store the students visited a café where they developed their life skills by ordering a drink ... and for some a portion of chips which I believe Mr Borrett also enjoyed!

One of our parent community, Mrs Donnelly, who works for Hays Recruitment, along with her colleague, Mrs Pettitt, have visited the school at regular intervals over the year to deliver sessions to Years 9,10 and 11. These sessions covered areas such as job opportunities, CV writing, mock interviews, alongside a wealth of other relevant and interesting information. We are very grateful to them for the time they have given to CAEA. We always welcome parent involvement so if you would like to come and speak to our students about your career, please do not hesitate to contact me.

Unfortunately, the Year 10 work experience day planned for June had to be cancelled at the last minute, but we are hoping to carry this trip out in the Autumn term.

At CAEA we are continuously looking at improving our careers provision for our students, as this is an important area for them as they consider their next step choices. At the end of the term a student evaluation was carried out and this helped us to see what they enjoyed and other areas they would like to be included – as always, the student and parental voice is an important part of our school community.

On the 1st of May, Art students from Caribbean, Atlantic, Coral and Pacific groups visited the Sainsbury Centre for Visual Arts at the UEA in Norwich to experience a number of exhibitions, installations and interactive workshops.

The groups were given the opportunity to explore the current exhibition, 'Can the Seas survive Us?' which centred around how different artists explored the concept of the sea, it's meaning and importance, historically and today using alternative media practices. After lunch, the groups explored the impressive permanent collection that included diverse work by many famous artists, before concluding the visit by walking part of the sculpture park within the beautiful grounds.

Finally, as a bonus to the trip, the group participated in the 'Pixel Project' [Art x Games] which is a partnership between the Sainsbury Centre learning team and City College Norwich Games Design and Development department. This was a public 'playtest' where the groups were able to try out the various game demos and feedback/meet the games developers and hear about how they have incorporated objects from the Sainsbury Centre collection into playable video games.



Overall, it was a great day for the students who were able to explore, discover and interact with a variety of creative works from an impressive range of artists.



CAEA Equipment Provision

At CAEA, we promote our students to be as independent and organised as possible, however, we appreciate that students may find this challenging for a variety of reasons.
